## A Message from Pastor Connie Happell

Dear Edgewood Saints,

As we look back on 2023, we marvel at the changes our congregation has experienced. While we continued to worship and serve the Lord with gladness and grow as followers of Jesus, we were stretched and grown in new ways in 2023. Years of intentional prayer and thoughtful conversation led to a vote of the congregation in October 2022 to place the Macon Road campus on the market. The property was listed in January 2023 and sold to CityScape Church in September. Thanks be to God that the gospel of our Lord Jesus will continue to be proclaimed at the corner of Macon and University.

The Session decided to move to a temporary “nest” at First Presbyterian in Columbus. Our first worship service at the Nest was on June 25. We see in hindsight how the Lord provided for our needs with a fair price for our campus, a Nest that shelters us until we are ready to relocate, and money in the bank which Edgewood will steward as the Spirit leads.

The Session served Edgewood in unusually sacrificial ways in 2023, gathering often outside of regular meeting times to work through these matters. Many helped get the campus ready for sale and our congregation ready to move by organizing our belongings and blessing others with the things we no longer need. Similarly, the move and the “home making” of the Nest were an all-hands-on-deck effort. A heartfelt thanks to each of you who prayed, pondered, and shared your hearts and your gifts in this season of change. We are grateful for those who walked alongside of us, lending their wisdom: Robert Hay of the Presbyterian Foundation, Ron King, Deb Tregaskis, and others from Flint River Presbytery and our realtor, Leah Braxton.

Amid these changes, Pete Sanders-Nesbitt and Susan Gilbert stepped up to preach and lead us in worship once each month as Commissioned Ruling Elders. They were commissioned by the Flint River Presbytery Committee on Ministry in May and a worship service to acknowledge their commissioning was held on September 10. Susan and Pete have added their deep wisdom, faith, preaching and leadership gifts to the witness of EPC at the Nest.



While most of us feel like we have had enough change, we trust that just as the Spirit led us through 2023, the Spirit will continue to lead us in 2024. Please read this report and marvel with me at God’s goodness. The Lord is at work in and among us and it is beautiful to behold. Trusting God alongside you,

### **Clerk of Session Report for 2023**

2023 was a memorable and monumental year in the life of Edgewood Presbyterian Church. On January 24 the session voted to place Edgewood's property on Macon Road on the market for sale. On March 12, the congregation voted by a 2/3 majority to sell the church on Macon Road. On August 6, the congregation voted by a 2/3 majority to accept an offer from the CityScape Church to purchase our property. We are pleased and thankful that the Macon Road church will continue to be used for God's glory, and we pray for success for the missions of the CityScape Church.

Edgewood began worshipping at our "Nest" in the chapel at First Presbyterian Church on 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue in Columbus in June. The chapel is beautiful and just the right size for us. We brought our own piano and other worship items. We have made the chapel our own little "nest", and all is working very well for our congregation. Edgewood members have experienced a challenging year in 2023, however, we are still diligently serving God's purposes with dedication, energy, imagination, and enthusiasm. We are looking forward to a new and meaningful future for Edgewood as we discover how God has planned to use us in His kingdom.

We began this year with 77 members. One of our members passed away this year: J.C. Bray. At the end of 2023, we have 72 members on our rolls.

## **Building and Grounds Team – Chris Posey**

The buildings and grounds team was busy in 2023 but not with our ordinary job functions. With the potential sale of the property on Macon Road early in the year, we started preparing the buildings for sale and started clearing out classrooms, storage areas, and all other spaces that were holding things we simply did not need any longer. We were fortunate enough to have some giveaway opportunities where we were able to upcycle many of our things to church members and others in the community that had a need.

When Edgewood received an official offer, the busy work began. We waited until the due diligence period was over before we started acting. At that time, we reached out to a few different churches around town and First Presbyterian was the only one willing and able to allow us to use their facilities for worship, classrooms, and administrative offices.

Through countless hours of cleaning, discarding, and packing, we were finally able to begin the breakdown of all our classrooms, offices, worship spaces, kitchen, and storage areas for transfer to either our storage unit at River Mill or to our new location now known as the Nest. We contracted with two moving agencies to assist in our moving and all was completed within 30 days of having to turn the building over to the new owners.

We want to thank everyone who had a part in assisting us clean, pack, move, coordinate and anything else behind the scenes to make this happen. This was not an easy undertaking but with the dedication and commitment to Edgewood, we made it happen!

This team will cease at the end of 2023 as we are a tenant of First Presbyterian Church, and they are handling all of the facilities upkeep for us. We encourage anyone interested to join in on the planning process for what is next for Edgewood, so keep an eye out for opportunities in 2024.



## **Children & Young Adult Ministry – NaEisha Owens**

As we reflect on the past year, I am thrilled to share the vibrant and impactful journey of the Children's and Young Adult Ministry at Edgewood Presbyterian Church.

### **\*\*Last Hurrah and Family Fun Day:\*\***

Our farewell to the previous location was marked by an unforgettable Last Hurrah and Family Fun Day with our supportive scouts. This day of celebration was filled with joy, laughter, and a genuine sense of community. Activities brought families together, fostering lasting relationships that go beyond the physical walls of our church. The attendance exceeded expectations, reinforcing the strong bonds within our congregation.

### **\*\*Transition to a New Location:\*\***

The transition to our new location was more than a relocation; it was an adventure. The "Great Edgewood Adventures" program made this journey special by encouraging kids to explore Bible studies and activities with their families. A scavenger hunt not only taught them essential Bible stories but also allowed them to familiarize themselves with the new building in an engaging and educational manner.

The parade, held in our primary sanctuary, was a spectacular showcase of academic and extracurricular accomplishments. ### **\*\*Autism Awareness:\*\***

We also hosted an Autism Awareness Day, allowing one of our parents to speak during the service on the final Sunday of Autism Awareness Month. We all wore blue in solidarity and support. Additionally, we attended an Autism Awareness Festival and partnered with Cascade Hills to take a tour of their facilities to continually improve our ministry for specific needs.

### **\*\*Parental Support and Acknowledgment:\*\***

We extended our support to young parents through heartfelt notes and parental support letters. Recognizing their daily efforts and unique challenges, we initiated a program that allowed us to be present in their children's extracurricular activities. This not only strengthened our connection with the families but also emphasized our commitment to supporting them beyond the church environment. To provide parents with a much-needed break, we also introduced the "Parents' Night Out" program.

### **\*\*Support our kiddos:\*\***

We also launched the "Support Our Kiddos Outside of Church Walls" program. Parents provided information about their kids' extracurricular activities, enabling us to support them outside of the church walls. Edgewood Presbyterian Church members attended our kiddos' sporting events,



and even those not local sent videos of their participation. It's crucial for us to show our children that our support extends beyond Sundays from 10 to 12, reaching into every aspect of their lives.

#### **\*\*Involvement of Young Adults:\*\***

The involvement of NaEisha and Amy Spear on the Abbey board was a significant step in creating a welcoming space for young adults with initiatives like midterm prayer and snack bags. Local congregations contributed by generously donating snacks and offering encouraging letters and prayers.

The personal growth of our young members was evident in their contributions. Michael Massey's and Andrew Massey's service as ushers and technology ministry contributors showcased the diverse talents within our youth community. The active participation of teenagers and young adults in various ministries showcased the vibrancy of our youth community.

We're also planning to partner with the Abbey next year to launch the "Abbey In Action" program. At the onset of the academic year, our vision is to invite a diverse group of individuals, particularly Christian professionals, to contribute to the program. This could include professionals from various fields, community members, and successful individuals offering insights and guidance to our college students.

The primary goal is to ensure that our students are not only well-prepared academically but are also equipped with the necessary skills and faith-based principles to thrive after graduation.

#### **\*\*Future Initiatives:\*\***

Looking ahead, our vision includes introducing Edgewood's values to local fire departments and police stations. Our plan is to foster connections by sponsoring monthly dinners for fire stations, delivering donuts to local police stations, and inviting them to learn more about our church and ministries.

#### **\*\*Increased Community Presence:\*\***

Our engagement with the community reached new heights through social media. Posting activities and Bible studies for families allowed us to connect beyond our physical space. Weekly Facebook and Instagram posts became a window into our thriving congregation, spreading the good news of Jesus Christ and creating a positive online presence.

#### **\*\*Growth and Continuity:\*\***

Our primary goal of stabilizing for our kiddos was achieved with a focus on continuity and support. Care packages, thoughtfully delivered to those unable to attend our annual Christmas party, served as a reminder of our care and connection. As we closed the year, our annual Christmas celebration reinforced the spirit of togetherness.

Our primary goal was for the kids to know that even though many things changed around, the love of Christ is constant.

## **Discipleship Team – Cynthia Frey**

Pastor Connie Happell; Director of Youth and Young Families, NaEisha Owens; Stephanie Blackwell; Lucile DuToit; Sheryl Wright and Cynthia Frey, team leader, comprise this team. Encouraging our members and visitors to follow Jesus more fully, the church has had these activities this year.

The adult Sunday School has been very ably led by Susan Gilbert and Karen Wetherell using the top-notch resources of Right Now Media, a subscription service which is available to the church, its members, and friends. The class is well-attended with good participation.

The children's Sunday School class continues to be by RSVP, which is taken advantage of by one to three families. Its hallmark is that the children seem to feel "seen", and relationships between them and NaEisha Owens are warm and inspiring as she teaches them about Christ. Brianna Evans often assists. There is also always another adult present, as is our policy. Children up through second grade are encouraged to go with Ms. Owens and another scheduled adult after the Children's Message. A nursery is available but has not been used this year.

**Small Groups** have been active. Our Wednesday night Bible study met the first six months of the year. Nearly all year a group of eight to twelve ladies have met for lunch and a Bible study at Stephanie Blackwell's home. For about eight months a small group of men met for Bible study weekly, through Zoom, using Right Now Media. Pastor Connie, Karen Wetherell, Liz Allison, and Kris Jain have led a number of important book studies as well. About a dozen of our ladies attended a retreat featuring a simulcast of Priscilla Shirer.

Members are encouraged to serve internationals through the English as Second Language classes and devotionals. Stephanie Blackwell and Cynthia Frey are teachers to this population through the International Friendship Ministry.

NaEisha has embodied the actions of ensuring that our young people see their place in the church family and has kept in close contact with them, as well as leading them into participation and service in meaningful ways. Please read her report and be encouraged yourself.

We had a drive to see if we would be a good fit as mentors for the scout troop's members' work on their merit badges.

Our whole Congregation has been involved in discipleship this year. Our Daily Bread booklets are made available quarterly. Each household had an Advent devotional book, was encouraged to attend the Advent Celebration, and was invited to the Birthday Party for Jesus.

Mid-year found us very active in making the move from Macon Road to storage and distribution of many of our things, and settling into The Nest.

Because for part of the year we had a visitor who is Deaf, a short-term American Sign Language class was offered. We also encouraged attendance at the movie, "His Only Son", by purchasing tickets for members.

The Outreach Team and Discipleship Team have been reunited.

Besides the physical feeding of the Columbus State University students, some of our members are more actively involved in the Abbey and we hope to forge relationships that will help meet their spiritual needs as well.



### DDM Team – Kris Jain

2023 was a busy year for DDM. We successfully navigated the relocation of most of our technology equipment from Macon Road to our nest at First Presbyterian. Our streaming services were up and running on August 1<sup>st</sup>. We did incur some costs when we moved and had to purchase a new phone system. However, the funding for this came from Flint River Presbytery's Walter Flint Fund. In 2024, we plan on taking advantage of future funds as we expand our DDM ministry.

These volunteers also worked tirelessly to pack and then unpack our kitchen from Macon Road to the Nest. The purpose of the Stewardship Team is to develop the financial policies, monitor the operating budget of the church, and conduct the annual stewardship campaign during which members are encouraged to grow in the life of the church by pledging their time, talents and gifts to the mission and work of the church.

The purpose of the Staff Support Team is to assist in hiring, termination, counseling, and support for the staff of the church, and maintaining personnel records as required by law.

Our teams continued to meet via Zoom or email in 2023.

Here are tasks and accomplishments for 2023:

- Gus Youmans conducted a review of 2022 church books with financial secretary. This was near completion as of the date of this report.
- After Janet Peters departed as financial secretary, the services of Robinson, Grimes & Company, CPAs were enlisted. The church will no longer have the paid position of financial secretary on staff.
- Financial activity related to the sale of the Macon Rd. property and relocation expenses were carefully managed and reported. Proceeds from the sale of the property were invested with New Covenant Trust Company at the recommendation of the Presbyterian Foundation who helped guide us during the sale of the property.
- Stewardship season was a busy time of turning our church's attention to "voices of stewardship." With the decline in pledges for 2024, the session has agreed to pull from investments in accounts at Edward Jones to help balance the budget and continue our ministries.
- Opportunity lists were gathered up and compiled for the Session teams.
- Year-end appreciation gifts were distributed to our church staff.

## **Worship Team – Susan Gilbert**

The Worship Team, which is composed of Susan Gilbert, Sue Ellen Williams, Connie Happell, Patricia Banks, Lucile DuToit and Karen Wetherell, was busy this year, working to make the worship hour on Sunday mornings meaningful and special for the members of Edgewood Presbyterian Church.

Scout Sunday was February 12, and scouts from the troops we sponsored participated in worship with the pledge, scripture reading and collecting offerings.

We had an Ash Wednesday service on February 22 and a Maundy Thursday service on April 6. The Easter Flower cross was placed in its regular place in front of the church on Easter Day. Many pictures were taken at the cross after the worship service.

On Pentecost in May, birds were hung from the ceiling in the narthex to represent the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Connie's contract with Edgewood was changed in May, and she began preaching two Sundays per month. Connie began preaching on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sundays. Pete Sanders Nesbitt began preaching on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday and Susan Gilbert on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday each month. Susan and Pete were commissioned by Flint River Presbytery to Edgewood Presbyterian Church in May.

The church on Macon Road was to be sold. In preparation for the move, many people spent many hours loading and labeling boxes to take to the "Nest" at First Presbyterian or to the storage facility. As we worked, we discovered we had an over-abundance of hymn books and Bibles, so we gave many to the Valley Rescue Mission and the Salvation Army before we moved.

On the last Sunday in our church on Macon Road, Paul Kauffman and Deb Tregaskis attended the worship service. Communion was served, and special items were removed from the sanctuary. On the first Sunday in the Nest at First Presbyterian, the special items were brought into the chapel one at a time and placed in their new place. Susan Gilbert preached on the 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday in the nest.

In July, Walter Cornwell, our pianist found a new job, and Eunmee Park began as our new pianist. Eunmee plays beautiful music for us each Sunday morning, and we are fortunate to have her as our pianist.

October 1 was World Communion Sunday. Connie brought in different types of bread from other areas of the world. Eunmee Park, our pianist, sang "Blessed Assurance" in the Korean language. The service was very meaningful.

November 5 was All Saints' Day and J.C. Bray was remembered on that day.

On December 3, members went Christmas caroling to our shut-in members. The singing was meaningful to the singers and to those who came to listen.

The choir presented a Christmas Cantata, *One Small Child*, on December 10. Though the choir had only eight members at this time, the cantata was enjoyed by the singers and the congregation. Sue Ellen is seeking to hire two paid singers to sing with the choir.

Handbells played in the nest at First Presbyterian in November and December.

The church was decorated for Advent and Christmas. The Christmas Eve service was meaningful with Sue Ellen and Pete singing a duet and the choir singing an anthem. Communion was served by intinction. Susan Gilbert and Pete Sanders-Nesbitt shared the presentation of the message.
